

COMMANDMENTS OF ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY

- If you put human beings in a situation of economic dependency--regardless of their race, language, nationality or economic standing--they not only react in an astonishingly similar fashion but they develop the same mindset.
- The debilitating impacts of dependency are the same and are universal no matter what your social, ethnic, or economic standing is, or the source of the resources creating dependency.
- The more dependent one is, the less control or power that one can exercise over their life, and ability to be selfsufficient.
- The more wealth you have, the greater care and discipline you have to exercise in how you spend it (whether you are a person within a family, a government, or an official within an organization).


COMMANDMENTS OF ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY

- Prolonged economic/welfare dependency begins as a state of poverty, and becomes a mindset.
- The greater degree you expect others to provide for your interests, the greater the degree of control that you relinquish over your life.
- You cannot get the good feelings or euphoria and selfworth necessary to maintain balance without doing the work to acquire what you need to survive.
- Prolonged dependency can lead to a host of negative emotions and attitudes that can harm one's health, psychological balance, attitudes, and ability to move constructively out of the dependency mindset.

Native dropout rate to cost economy billions, new study suggests

Canada stands to lose billions over the next decade in lost productivity and labour growth because almost one in two aboriginal youths doesn't graduate from high school, a study being released today suggests.

The study, by Ottawa's Centre for the Study of Living, projects Canada's gross domestic product would grow by an additional \$71-billion by 2017 if aboriginals had the same graduation rate as the rest of the population.

Using figures from the 2001 census, the study said only 52 per cent of Canada's aboriginals earned a high-school diplobecause more than half the aboriginal population in Canada is now under 25, the study said.

Aboriginals without a highschool education earn less money and are twice as likely to be unemployed than those with a diploma, the study said.

Only 8.9 per cent of aboriginals held a university degree in 2001 compared with almost 22 per cent of non-aboriginals.

Assembly of First Nations National Chief Phil Fontaine said it's clear aboriginals are an "untapped resource." They are the fastest growing segment of the population, he said.

OTTAWA • Lifting the educational attainment of aboriginal youth to that of other Canadians would not only enrich their lives economically and financially but would enrich the economy by tens of billions of dollars, says a new study being released today, which claims to be the first to put a dollar figure on the benefits of achieving such a goal.

- Good Leadership:
 - Good leaders have good ideas and are able to muster political support to implement ideas
- Good Institutional Environment:
 - Critical for managing aid/transfer payment relationship and transitioning to own-source revenue
- Good Economic Policies:
 - Economic policies that result in relying on private sector as engine of growth

- Development Depends On:
 - Stable institutions and policies
 - Fair and effective mechanisms for resolving disputes
 - Separation of politics from business management
 - A competent bureaucracy

- Development Depends On:
 - Cultural match (means governing institutions based on):
 - Legitimacy not tradition: (1) have the support of those governed (not imposed): (2) generated freely and inclusively through indigenous efforts: (3) embody values that Indigenous peoples feel are important
 - current ideas of good governance (possibly rethinking ideas of how to govern and inventing new ways that better meet their needs).
